I worked with Lonza until 2009, when I changed my work from the hectic industry sector to the hectic NHS sector...working for the Prostate Cancer Foundation based at the Nottingham City Hospital. I am a Research Fellow with the Foundation and work in Urology meeting patients with prostate problems. Now I get to put a face to the work I have been doing and it really is thoroughly enjoyable. I have set up a tissue bank here at the hospital now for prostate cancer patients which we carry out our research on.

I hope to visit Westholme and all the Westholmians when I get back, and no doubt I will bump into you at one of the Christmas concerts!


**Ben Milnes and Andrew Lee (left 2010)**

*There were 21 of us in our year and for the past 3 years we have been trained daily in voice, singing, movement, dance, stage combat, acting, screen and radio. Getting up and doing what you love to do every day is the best of times.*

*We have taken part in a variety of workshops with various admired and talented people from Francois Lecoq to James McAvoy - it has been so wonderful to have been immersed in an environment in which everyone is so dedicated and passionate about what they do - the encouragement and support is really*



*strong - allowing you to explore and develop freely. I have learnt so much in my time there and feel completely ready to start work in a professional environment.*

*Every year the class is divided into two groups and each put on a show. First year looks at American plays, second year is Shakespeare and third year includes high style, panto and a contemporary. I was initially excited about the prospect of playing a girl on stage - not a boy - which, in every show I was in at Westholme was the case!*

*I have really enjoyed the variety of roles I have been given to play and in the third year I was especially privileged to be given the role of Arkadina in 'The Seagull' - there was a celebration of Chekhov in Glasgow and we performed the show 100 years to the day that it had been performed in Glasgow in English previously for the first time. The adaptation we worked on was by Stewart Paterson who was consistently present in the rehearsal room supporting us and teaching us huge amounts of Chekhov. I remember learning about 'Three Sisters' and 'The Seagull' at Westholme and going to see a production of it in Blackpool for the first time vividly.*

*We ran the show for a week in November and Damian Cruden, who is Artistic Director at York Theatre Royal came to see it and decided that he wanted to take the whole production - including set design and costume created by TPA students - to his theatre for a longer run, working alongside a professional cast. In May a*



*group of us began rehearsals with a set of professional actors and performed at York Theatre Royal for just under 3 weeks. The professionals took the older parts and we played the younger characters - I played the part of Masha due to Arkadina being 43 and it was such a brilliant experience, one that came at the perfect time and gave us a great insight into the transition from Drama School into the world of acting professionally.*

*The theatre in York is beautiful and has the most amazing stage and traditional atmosphere - it was a joy to be there and unbelievable to think that I was performing on this stage with people I love - doing what I always wanted to do, casually acting with professionals who had put their trust in us to deliver!*

*I have been given so many wonderful opportunities at the RSAMD and in its way the college reminds me so much of Westholme - an environment of students and teachers working together as a community wanting to achieve the best possible and providing each other with great support.....enjoying themselves.*

*When I graduated I almost felt like it was a complete continuation from Westholme - not only did the RSAMD feel like a natural progression as a school but the robes that we wore at graduation were purple and green - perfect!*

Katy had certainly put her money where her mouth was, so to speak, by giving up her privileged London life in the fast lane of advertising to go out to Cambodia, living on a pittance, to make a difference with the charity at the coal-face.

She spoke movingly to the girls and they were enthused to help, raising hundreds of pounds through a concert and a day wearing nail-varnish! The last I heard from her she was looking forward to moving onto Bangkok and emailed to say, "I just found out 2 days ago that I have a job with an organisation that raise awareness throughout S.E. Asia through large concerts and education programming. I will be in charge of engaging groups of Youths from 6 countries to enable them to educate their communities about trafficking and how to prevent themselves and their friends from being trafficked. Very exciting!" Humbling to see how an individual can make such a difference.

A little closer to home, we heard from **Krissy Hurst** (left 1999, pictured top right). She completed the London Marathon this year in 4 hours and 42 minutes to raise money for Diabetes UK, in honour of her younger

*"Dear Mrs Croston (and other members of staff),*

*I had a fantastic first year studying Natural Sciences (Biology & Chemistry) at Durham and I cannot believe I am now half way through my degree.*

*It took me a few weeks to get used to learning in a lecture based environment rather than a classroom, but I soon got into the swing of things and managed to gain a first class mark of 74% in the first year summer examinations.*

*I have tried to stay actively involved in other areas of university life too and not just restrict myself to keeping my head in a book.*

*I am part of Grey College's Environment and Charity Committee and I am also president of the college Dance society this year. This position involved me choreographing weekly dance routines and being responsible for all the administration of the society. I am a college cheerleader so have to represent the college at boys' rugby matches, and we won the inter-college cheerleading competition last year for the fifth year in a row.*

*I am also being actively involved in the local community via 'Foodcycle', where I help to prepare meals at the local homeless shelter, and I also run an after school dance club at the local primary school which is hard work but very rewarding.*

*At the university there is an opportunity to apply to go on various expeditions to raise money for charity through DUCK - Durham University Charity Committee. This is a highly competitive process but I have been successful in securing a place on the Cambodia Project - involving teaching in two or three schools for three weeks in Samraong, a province in North-West Cambodia. This will be an*

*invaluable experience as I would like to become a teacher in the future.*

*The cost to be a part of this project is £2200, half of which goes directly to charity. The charities that DUCK support are the FutureSense Foundation; which works towards developing local communities, contributing in the areas of Education, Women's empowerment, Livelihoods, Community Development, Child care and Health care, and the Burma Education Partnership, an educational charity working in the Burmese Refugee camps along with the Thailand-Burma border providing English teachers to the numerous make-shift schools and developing a curriculum to support and train the existing teachers.*
